By Pat Murphy sint witter Opponents of the proposed waste-to-energy inclinerator in Auburn Hills have targeted three commis-sioners for a phone call campaign. Residents calling their organiza-tion RALL (Residents Against Incin-eration and Landfills) railed against the county's proposed \$470 million solid waste plan Thorsday during a meeting of the 641 committee re-viewing it for linal approval. Leaffets distributed at the meet-ing said, "\$170,165,000 plus Interest Co an incinerator in Auburn Hills. Conceived and brought to term by

the Oakland County Commission. "Direct to you without conscience or responsibility your elected coun-ty politicians give you DEBT and AIR POLLUTION." The leaflets urge voters to "Con-tact your commissioner who voted for the incinerator."

"Voters in Rochester have been napping," said Michael Duncanson, who identified himself as a Roches-ter resident and a public school teachor, "But I think they are finally waking up to what their politikians are doing to them." He predicted a groundswell of po-litical opposition when the solid waste plan goes to the board of com-missioners for approval. In private discussions, Duncanson for the Incinerator."
