"It makes me wonder why. It's not necessary. Why can't they last let us go?" said Danquole, who es-caped Communist occupation of Lithuania after World War II. Three self-avowed revolutionary communists pleaded guilty to mis-demeanor trespassing charges stemming from distribution of party leaflets at Farmington High five days before a local posce march for racial harmony in October. Detroiters Audrey Ann Davis, 32, a postal employee, Oren Darroll Jackson, 38, listed as unemployed, and Shawa Bernard Stewart, 18, a supermarket employee, pleaded guilty March 20 and wolved their right to raise First Amendment is-sues.

Sues. District Judge Margaret Schaeffer of Farmington fined each \$25 and placed them on probation for nine months

placed them en probation for nice monts. Davis, Jackson and Stewart are members of the revolutionary com-munist Progressive Labor Party's Detroit branch of the International Committee Against Racism (InCAR). The New York-based group has 29 offices, including locations in the Netherlands and Great Britain. The controversial group believes in militant, mass action with vio-taceist and anti-imperlaits itvers. In October, InCAR planned to counterprotest the neo-Natl S.S. Ac-tion Group. The neo-Natls canceled





fund-raiser at the Ritz-Carlton Ho-tel, the Jurgitis' were there armed with protest signs. Paul Jorquits was at Detroit Metropolitan Air-port earlier that day waving a 10-foot by 12-foot Lithuanian flag he made himself.
