## Lawyers work on plea bargain for Bonelli's cousin

A cousin of convicted murdeer Acousin of convicted murdeer Anthopy Bosell is not expected to stand trial on a charge that he was an accessory after the fact in the drowning death of 17-year-old Kristina Marie Fracchia.

A plee bargain for James Nader, who has admitted giving Bonelli a ride from the murder seene and providing him with gloves and marijuana, appears likely, said defense attorney Sanford Rockhind and assistant prosecutor Fred Miller.

Nader's testimony in the Bonelli trial, which ended Friday, is expected to set the stage for a plea bargain, the attorneys indicated, though nether knew what the terms might be.

"We're hopeful that because of Mr. Nader's participation in the Bonelli prosecutor print amendment right to self-incrimination, the matter will be resolved without the need for a trial and that an appropriate plea bargain can be entered into," Rockhind said.

Nader also admitted supplying Bonelli with gloves and marijuana, which he placed near Bonelli's home on the morning before Fracchia's death.

Nader said he had already been told by Bonelli that Bonelli planned to kill Fracchia. He said he provided the gloves and marijuana because "I owed him a favor." Nader also left a "good-luck" note for Bonelli, who faces a mandatory sentence of life in prison.

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
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
