• GOLF LESSONS

Get back into the swing of things with some sound basic tips of golf. Six lessons will cover proper stance, grip and swing. Classes begin the week of April 30 at Novi Oaks Golf and Sport Center and meet twice a week, Monday, Wednesday or Tuesday and Thursday. Each class is 50 minutes. Scheduled lessons are for children, teens, adults and senior.

• DISCOVERY WAGON

Classes are 50 minutes and begin the week of June 11 at Farmington and North Farmington High School. Classes are available for children, teens, adults and senior adults. Fee is \$28 per person, \$18 per person for senior adult classes.

• DAY CAMPS

Openings are still available for some of the day camp sessions at Camp Wee Wonna (3-5 year olds), Camp All-U-Wonna (6-8 year olds), Camp Camp-On-A-Wonna (9-12 year olds), and Nature's Way (6-8 and 9-10 year olds). Camps are held at Heritage Park except for Camp Wee Wonna which is at Oakland Community College and begin the week of June 18. Fees range from \$50-\$65 per person.
