

# Soroptimists Announce Three Award Winners

FARMINGTON Barbara Pape, a North Farmington High School senior, has been named winner of the Youth Citizenship Award granted by the Farmington Soroptimists.

The \$150 first-place award qualifies Miss Pape to enter the competition for the regional Soroptimists award of \$1,000.

The Soroptimists give \$1,000 awards to each of its 15 region winners.

**FIRST RUNNERUP** in the Farmington competition was Kathleen Christmas of Farmington Senior High. Second runnerup was Anthony Abowd of Our Lady of Sorrows Catholic High School.

Miss Pape plans to become a doctor, most likely specializing in pediatrics. Miss Christmas, who received a \$100 cash award, plans to enter the field of nursing.

Abowd, who has earned a \$50 award, is interested in the arts of communication.

Each award may be used at the discretion of the recipient in any way he may decide will best further his aims and purposes in achieving his life goal.

"The Quiet Room is an area set aside for all ages to come in and read and relax. The Rotary Club will donate the furnishings which will include a table and chairs, comfortable armchairs and an exhibit case for community displays.

"Our club picked the Library District for our community service project," Comfort explains, "because our members wanted to make a gift to the entire community."

"The Library was chosen because it serves both city and township, both young and old, and persons of varying need and circumstance," Comfort explains, "and the library certainly contributes a very worthwhile service to the community."

The \$400 was raised by a recently completed sale of Metro Passbooks. Roger Peck, fund-raising chairman for the Rotary Club, is now

planning other events to raise the \$2,600 balance.

"The new library will be Farmington's cultural landmark," adds Mrs. Allison, "and will provide our citizens an opportunity to establish living memorials not only for associations, organizations and service clubs but individuals as well to perpetuate the varied activities and achievements of the area."

**THE LIBRARY** also provides, she continues, an opportunity for local artists to display their talents.

"It would be most noteworthy if the displays in permanent positions in the library, or even on a circulating basis, could be those of Farmington citizens."

There will be ample wall area, shelf and counter space for exhibits, according to Mrs. Mary Mitchell, the new librarian for Farmington.

"It is the desire of the library board to have in its book collection reference volumes needed by our local industries, businesses and professions," adds Mrs. Allison. "These groups are invited to let their requirements be known."

All contributions, either from individuals, business or industry, are tax deductible.

"Not to be forgotten, in the front of the building, which faces 12 Mile Road, at the recessed space under the

windows of the Quiet Room, is a unique location for a suitably designed piece of sculpture to enhance further the structural beauty of the architecture," concludes Mrs. Allison.

## Medic Joins Pilot Program

Richard Weston, 26, of Farmington, is among 23 former military corpsmen who have been accepted for the Medex Demonstration Program at Dartmouth College Medical School in Hanover, N.H.

In conjunction with the program, the men enrolled are being retrained for civilian careers as physicians' assistants.

Medex, a collaborative research effort with the New Hampshire Medical Society, seeks to improve the availability of primary medical care in New England, particularly in remote rural areas.

Following a three-month academic program at Dartmouth, Weston will begin a year of preceptorship training under the supervision of a cooperating physician in private practice in one of the four northern New England states.

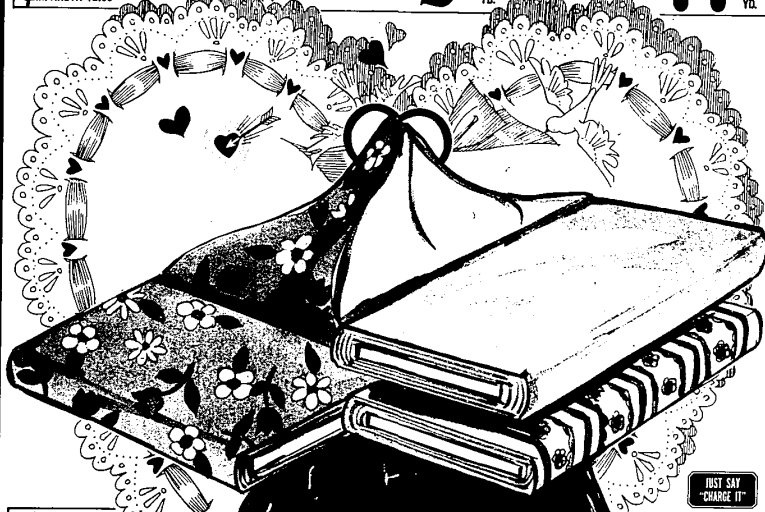
