CITY HALL news beat

● FARMINGTON

● City logo — The city is continuing work on a city logo for use on the city seal and other official documents.

The theme will be the image of a family and a tree, developed many years ago as part of a Keep Farmington Beautiful program. The logo

will incorporate the community's founding in 1824.

Final artwork must still be done.

● New appointees — The city council has reappointed Lee Ratliff and Robert Walker to the Board of Zoning Appeals. Ditto for board al-

ternates William Burke and William Hartsock. Their new term expires June 1993.

Sandra Shelly and Donna Damon have been appointed to the Farmington Beautification Committee. They will serve a two-year term expiring June 1992.

● Cable budget — The city council has approved the Southwest Oakland County Cable Commission's 1990-91 budget, which provides for cable franchise oversight and public access support staff.

Part of this year's budget includes purchase of a soon-to-be-abandoned

Farmington Hills fire station near Grand River and 10 Mile.

The building will be converted to permanent offices for SWOCC equipment as well as for a new public access studio.

Metrovision of Oakland County will provide an annual contribution of \$25,000 to help remodel, equip and maintain the new facility.

SWOCC, through franchise fees and other revenues, will receive \$275,885 next year.

It also is subject to approval by the city councils in Farmington Hills and Novi.

Program for elderly gets \$20,000 grant

Independence For Life, a non-profit, Farmington Hills-based corporation serving the transportation needs of the elderly in Michigan, has received a grant for \$20,000 from the Skillman Foundation.

Independence For Life provides passenger vans to human service agencies for the transportation of senior citizens.

Currently, it has 87 vans providing transportation to medical facilities, business and banking, social

service agencies, shopping areas, senior centers and to volunteer commitments.

The \$20,000 grant from the Skillman Foundation will be used to buy a van for use by seniors in the Detroit area.

The Skillman Foundation was founded in 1960 by Rose P. Skillman, widow of Robert H. Skillman, vice president and director of Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Co.


