Stati witter Five communities, including Farmington Hills, were notified as soon as possible that water service would be interrupted over the Me-morial Day hrilday weekend, ac-cording to a Detroil Water and Sewerage D:partment official. "It wan't like we knew last Mon-day (May 21)," said James Healt, Detroil Water and Sewerage Depart-ment maintennee and repair super-intendent. Like residu...is, Farmington Hills officials winked they had more no-tice that water would be scarce for much of the city, generally north of 1-656, Friday night and most of Sait-urday.

"I was a little upset we didn't get more noillication," assistant city manager David Call said. "I don't know why we didn't get more noill-cation. All we could do was coordi-nate communication to the public."

WATER SERVICE was interrupt-ed as of 11:30 p.m. Friday. It was supposed to resume within six hours. Interrupting service was the only way of completing repair of a rup-tured Detroit S4-inch water main at 14 Mile and Northwestern Highway.
