Haywood plans to launch his anti-drug program into schools and com-panies across the country, starting with elementary schools in the city of Detroit this devastation of drugs." HAYWOOD IS getting help from leaders throughout the state, includ-ing state Supreme Court Justice Denis Archer, "It's just one small effort," said Archer, speaking at last week's breakfast. "But it is my de-sire to cover, in September or Octo-ber, the 166 elementary schools in Detroit using Spencer's tape and pro-gram. gram.

"If it's successful, this road map can be used in any city in the state of Michigan, or anywhere. Let Michi-gan be first and the other 49 states can follow."

Companies are also getting in-volved in the Haywood program, in-cluding Ford Motor Co., which is us-ing it as part of the Ford/UAW Em-ployee Assistance Program.
