• "Diamonds Are Forever: Artists and Writers on Baseball" (1987). Contains essays, poems and random thoughts of American writers on "the thinking man's game. • "Night Shift" (1978). In the opinion of a book columnist we all know and love, these lusclously terrifying short stories, written in the days before Stephen King became Stephen King, are far and away his best efforts ever.

• "Little Big Man" (1984). Told by the fictional Jack Crabb (who claims to be the only non-Indian survivor of Custer's Last Stand), this novel by Thomas Berger is another offbeat Western and makes for a sometimes funny, sometimes sad, always entralling look at the Old West.

• "I Stop the Body Electric"

(1989). A terrific collection of 18 pleasantly bizarre short stories by Ray Bradbury. In "Tomorrows Child," you can read about the unfortunate Peter Horn, who happens to be "the father of a small blue pyramid." In "The Tombling Day," Grandma Lobillily exhumes the body of her long-dead lover ammakes an important discovery. And in Bradbury's popular title story, a motherless family its cared for by a practically porfect grandmother—so what if she sin' quite human. Bradbury at bis best.

"The Painted Word" (1978). Whether or not you agree with author Tom Wolfe's Irreverent conclusions on modern art and its creators, you'll be entertained by this short book on the subject.
