### Culture may account for higher scores by Asians

Why do students in Far Eastern countries, such as Japan and Taiwan, consistently score higher than their American counterparis on achievement tests?

Cultural differences are a primary factor, according to Farmington Hills resident Paul Tai, professor of political science and director of the Asian Studies Program at the University of Detroit.

Tal directed a recent survey that compared the attitudes and behavior of Michigan residents and Taiwanese citizens concerning education.

Results showed that 46 percent of the respondents in Taiwan spent least five hours weekly helping their children with homework. That figure compares to 17 percent for Michigan residents who responded.

children with homework."

THE SURVEY also found that 74 percent of the Michigan residents held jobs while in high school, while only 36 percent of Taiwan students were employed during the high school years.

"The assumption made at the onset of the survey was that children coming from families with a strong levelion to deducation will then to focus on their studies and to minimize distractions from outside jobs," Tal said. "The survey results seem to bear this out.


"In that country's culture, most people would consider the student who works after school to be shirk-ing his educational duties," the U-D professor said.

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
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
