# Unconventional drama powerfully interpreted

Performances of the Jewish Ensemble Theatre production of "Slow Dance on the Killing Ground" continue through Sand-day, July 1, at the Jewish Com-munity Center in West Bloom-field. For ticket information call the box office at 788-2900.

As its title suggests, "Slow Dance on the Killing Ground" is not the most conventional of dramas. As skillfully presented by the Jewish Ensemble Theatre, this little-known play by William Hanley is powerful, puzzling and thought-provoking.

set in a small Brooklyn candy store in 1962, on the same day that Adolf Eichmann was hung for war crimes, the drama explores guilt and the universal need for love and ac-ceptance. Circumstances bring three very disparate characters together for some sout-searching.

or some sour-searching.
Glass (David Fox), a non-Jewish
German who purports to have been a
political prisoner in a concentration
camp, now leads a quiet existence as
the owner of the store. Randall (Roosevelt T. Johnson) is a very strange
black teen who comes bounding into
the store late at night, clearly heling
from the law. In Act I the pair does a
slow dance, circling each other with
accusations and hostility.

The first act ends with the sudden arrival of Rosle (Stacie Passon), a young woman who got lost on her way to an abortionist and faints as

soon as she reaches the store. In the remainder of the play, Rosie will serve as the catalyst that brings Glas and Randall to confess their truths and reach new understanding while bolt fit y to convince her to forget the abortion.

ALL THREE performers are ex-cellent, but Johnson's role is clearly the most demanding. Super-charged with energy most of the time, Ran-dall is a manle-depressive who occa-sionally runs out of gas and changes his whole persona. Incongruously dressd in dark glasses, top, but and short flowing cape, Randall all but swings from the light fixtures as he-nervously hops around the small store. He mixes mispronounced big

words with an exaggerated street-hip style of speech, his delivery at times as staccato as machine-gun

fire.

Occasionally one glimpses the other Randall, a ghetto victim who thinks hig brilliant mind and educated speech make him a freak in the heartless "killing ground" of his world

For is thoroughly convincing as the morose, antisocial Glas who has shut blinself away from the world and internalized all his anger. Passon is likewise very believable as the plain-looking Rosie, low in self-esteem but compassionate to others' pain.

Director Evelyn Orbach does a fine job orchestrating the trio of actors to react from each other. Pacing is smooth throughout. There is nothing "slow" about the production, despite its title and sparse physical action.

Melinda Pacha's set design for the seedy candy store is wonderful. One can almost see the dust stirring when Glas inventories the shelves, and feel the compactness of the world in which he has enclosed him-self.
