City Begins Tree, Lighting Campaigns

FARMINGTON
The campaign to provide outdoor lighting and trees for city residents has again been started by members of the City of Farmington Beautification Committee.

The project is another attempt of the city to help beautify its surroundings while at the same time providing people with the opportunity to illuminate, protect and beautify their property at a considerable savings, says Mrs. Carol Kurth, beautification committee chairman.

THE TREE-planting and lighting programs were two of the major projects which helped the beautification committee win a national award for its efforts.

Through a bulk-rate purchase arrangement, the City of Farmington is offering residents the choice of two electric exterior lamps.

Either a traditional or New Orleans style model can be installed for \$125 with both available in black or white.

Standard installation by the Electric Light of Michigan Co. includes the post being set in a concrete base with a maximum of 30-feet underground cable from the power source to the post light.

Cost for installing under roadways, driveways and other paved areas and additional footage beyond 30 feet is not included in the \$125 quote.

New wire-laying equipment eliminates the need for trenching, says Mrs. Kurth, and so there is little lawn damage done. Material and workmanship to be used on all installations is of the highest quality, she adds.

CITY MANAGER John Dinan reports the electric lights are being used this year because of the unavailability of new gas installations.

Dinan adds that in the long-range case of the lighting, the electric lamps provide an economical means of protecting and illuminating property.

The electric lamps can be operated for less than 50 cents per month.

Farmington Township residents may purchase the lamps at the discount prices through the city's program.

FOR THE THIRD year, the city will conduct its tree-planting program for residents and merchants. Order blanks for trees were included with letters sent out on the electric lamp program.

This year, trees will be offered at costs of \$20 and \$14.

The \$20 trees are those planted by the city in the public right-of-way and will carry a two-year guarantee. The \$14 trees are for those who wish to plant it themselves on private property. Trees planted by homeowners are not guaranteed.

Three species of trees will be available: the pin oak for Farmington Meadows and

Farmington Acres subdivisions; the imperial locust for Twin Valley subdivision; and the Norway maple for all other areas and business areas.

The ideal planting time is during the early part of April for the best survival, Dinan says.

Orders for both the trees and electric lamps must be placed no later than March 1. More information can be obtained from the city manager's office at 474-5500.

During the past two years more than 600 trees have been planted and more than 60 lamps installed.
