A: Leigh McCloskey was born on June 21, 1955, in Los Angeles and made his acting debut in a PTA play when he was in the third grade. He recalls realizing that he wanted become an actor when he was a sixth grader. Encouraged by his parents, he appeared in school plays at Santa Monica High and went on to study acting at Cal State Northridge. Then he headed for New York, where he studied for two years at The Juilliard School under John Houseman. He had roles in various plays before returning to Hollywood in 1975 to begin working in television, including the series Rich Man, Poor Man, Phyllis, Medical Center, Streets of San Francisco, Blind Sunday, Dallas; the television movies Dawn, Portrait of a Runaway, Alexander: The Other Side of Dawn. Bermuda Depths; and the feature films Inferno, Just One of the Guys and Lucky Stiff. I do not see his name listed as a cast member of Santa Bachara this year, however I see him frequently on commercials. His spare time interests include painting, sketching and sculpting. He plays the guitar, likes basketall and fencing, and is a pro football fan. McCloskey and his wife, Carla, an assistant director, live in Los Angeles.

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## 'Body by Jake's

Jake begins acting

By Christy Bergshen "The easy way out was to stick with Body by Jake, says Jake Steinfeld of why he decided to try acting in the new Family Channel sitcom Big Brother Jake. "I could have played it safe, but I wanted to extend myself beyond what people might have expected." The show airs Sundays, Tuesdays and Fridays and is the first comedy series the network has ever produced

Steinfeld's path to stardom has been circuitous one. He began a career as a bodybuilder and subsequently hosted the fitness program Body by Jake on

ESPN.
In Big Brother Jake, Steinfeld plays an L.A. stuntman who returns to Brooklyn to help his recently widowed foster mom (Barbara Meck). She's got a house full of foster children, but unless she finds a male role model, social services will remove them.

Steinfeld manages to mix a little bodybuilding with his acting on the show. If he forgets his lines or makes a blunder, he gets down on the floor and does a set of push-ups, to the delight of

studio audiences.
"When I first started working with Jake, I was concerned about his back of experience," says director Gary Shimokowa. "He has been terrific, really better than I had expected. He works well with the kids in the cast, and he is great at taking direction and fulfilling it."



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
