The Farmington Community Chorus is in its 11th season, and members are excited to entertain once again.

The singers are self-funded and much of the cost of producing and presenting the holiday and spring shows is carried by themselves.

"Over the years many people have asked how they could assist in our musical endeavors," said chorus member Jeff Zorn. "In response, last year we began the Friends of the Chorus. We were pleased with the results and it is now that time again when we are asking for continued financial support."

Zorn said that lately the chorus has had more requests by companies and organizations to perform additional concerts during the choral season. Those requests require sophisticated sound equipment that can be transported easily.

"This requires money," Zorn said.

"We know that the ability to contribute varies greatly among our friends, but the effort is important and all contributions will aid us."

Contributors of \$25-49 will be given two free tickets for the holiday and spring shows for the choral season.

A \$50 contributor will receive four tickets.

Those who contribute more than \$50 will receive first tickets, reserved seating and an audio cassette of the shows.

Any monetary contributions will be accepted and can be sent as a check payable to Farmington Community Chorus, Post Office Box 3028, Farmington Hills 48333. Donations should arrive before Nov. 1 for inclusion in the holiday program.

Volunteers needed for respite program

Alzheimer's Association, Detroit Area Chapter, is recruiting volunteers to assist with the In-Home Respite and Adult Day Care programs. Both services are available to residents of Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties. They relieve caregivers of people afflicted with Alzheimer's disease or another irreversible memory impairment. The respite is provided by trained volunteers.

Volunteers donate 4 to 16 hours per month. They are provided with extensive training by skilled professionals prior to placement. They are also reimbursed for mileage during the training and for mileage traveled to and from placement sites.

Day, evening and Saturday hours are available.

Working with a person afflicted with Alzheimer's disease can be a positive and rewarding experience. In-home volunteers provide companionship and supervision; Adult Day Care volunteers assist clients with social and recreational activities. Both programs allow opportunities for one-on-one interaction with clients but most important of all, respite provides caregivers with much needed free time.
