at 8 a.m., she said. "And I know he called at least one general from his boat."

The first lady went on to tell about the greeting days in August and September as she and her husband met the Gorbachevs and other leaders as

the president rallied support against the Iraqi invasion.

"IN HELSINKI (site of the one-day summit in September) I got two questions," Bush said. People repeatedly asked about "Milla (the family dog) and broccoli."

from constituents who voiced their views on things like the gas tax or cuts in Medicare.

Levin, the only Oakland representative who voted for the budget compromise, received hundreds of letters, said press secretary Cynthia L. Mann.

Levin agreed the budget compromise was unfair to middle Americans, Mann said. But he supported it because he considered it to be an orderly approach to dealing with the budget.

"HE ALSO EXPECTED to correct

some of the problems (like extending the waiting period for drawing unemployment to two weeks) in committee," she said. Levin is a member of the House Ways and Means Committee.

Bloomfield's staff said contacts with his office overwhelmingly supported his vote against the proposed budget.

"Most of the people who contacted our office agreed that more taxes on the middle class won't solve the problem," said Hauser. "The problem is too much government spending."

Referring to her husband's statement he doesn't like broccoli, Bush said. "It doesn't matter how I cook it, he won't eat it... so quit sending me those recipes."

As hectic and troublesome as her life might be at times, the president's wife said, "I love my life, I adore my children and I'm happy with my husband."

"I think she was great," said Yvonne Strother of Rochester Hills. "Barbara Bush is so genuine, so real. I think she's a role model for men and women, Democrats as well as Republicans."

Nancy Edmunds of Birmingham said she views Mrs. Bush as "a role leader... who sticks up for family values" as well as qualities like sincerity.

Besides being among 11 co-chairs of the fund-raiser, Strother and Edmunds finished first and second, respectively, in the competition to sell tickets — Strother with 80 and Edmunds with 54.

Edmunds said she had much success with independent voters as well as some Democrats. "I think people in both parties love and respect her."

Bush's talk was worth every bit of the \$100 ticket price, said Dr. June Kuczyński of Bloomfield Township. "She has such substance and such a comfortable delivery. She's obviously a professional who hasn't lost sight of the family."
