## police/fire calls

Listed below are some of the Farmington area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week:

### SUSPECTED ARSON

Fire that ended an estimated \$30,000 damage to three cars at Bob Saks Oldsmobile dealership, 33300 Grand River, about 2 p.m. Oct. 24, is listed as suspicious, according to Farmington Hills police and fire reports.

The fire began in a 1989 Jeep Cherokee after witnesses saw a man talking with another man and later saw the unidentified man lingering by the Cherokee.

When firefighters arrived, they found three vehicles involved in the fire. The Jeep was parked between two other vehicles. The entire passenger area of the Jeep was engulfed and the windows and sunroof were already out and the roof was starting to bend inward, according to a fire report.

After firefighters put out the majority of the fire and cooled the nearby building where the vehicles were parked, they worked on the other two cars. They then returned to the Jeep's engine compartment. Just before opening the hood, the area near the fire wall burst into flames, which also rolled out from under the hood.

A fourth vehicle also was damaged from an exploded window lift piston. Some damage also was caused to the building's insulation, according to fire reports.

### ARMED ROBBERY

An unidentified armed gunman in his early-to-mid 20s robbed the Old Orchard Shell, 31519 Northwestern Highway, Oct. 24, according to a Farmington Hills police report. No one was injured.

While one of three employees at the station left the building, with the door unlocked, the unidentified gunman walked in. He forced the other two employees into the bathroom.

The employee who left the building for a moment, returned and confronted the gunman, who put the gun into the employee's stomach and warned him not to do anything "stupid."

After a customer came and left, the gunman ordered the employee to open the cash register. After the gunman left, the two in the bathroom came out and saw the man driving away on westbound Northwestern Highway, according to police.

### TRUCK RAMS VAN

A man in a pickup truck, later determined to be stolen from a construction site in Farmington, caused a three-car accident on Orchard Lake north of Grand River on Thursday, Oct. 25. No one was seriously injured.

The driver of the pickup was arrested for a third offense of operating under the influence of alcohol.

The driver was in the Cligo gas station at the end of Orchard Lake Road, according to Farmington police. He left the station, heading northbound on Orchard Lake in the southbound lane. He struck a van, pushing it backwards about 75 feet before hitting a third car and pushing both into the parking lot of Classic Autos.

The owner of the pickup truck reported the vehicle missing Friday morning. He said it had been taken from the site of a house renovation.

### ASSAULT REPORTED

A 32-year-old man who lives in Chatham Hills Apartments was ticketed for assault and battery after allegedly kicking his sister in the head, back and legs on Oct. 24.

The 31-year-old victim, a Detroit woman, told Farmington public safety officers her brother became upset when she broke his portable telephone. The woman declined medical treatment.

# Teacher's re-sentencing set for Nov. 6

As area voters go to the polls Nov. 6, Farmington Hills resident David Michael Schultz will head for Oakland County Circuit Court for what could be a break of a lifetime.

A former Bloomfield Hills middle school teacher, the 28-year-old Schultz will be resentenced before Oakland Circuit Judge Hilda Gage on cocaine delivery charges in a 1986 Farmington incident, for which he received a 20- to 30-year mandatory prison term in 1987. He has

served his time in the Scott Correctional Facility in Plymouth.

The Michigan Supreme Court ordered a resentencing for Schultz in late August, upholding a Michigan Court of Appeals ruling. Schultz had appealed based on changes to the law, enacted in March of 1988, which allowed more lenient sentencing.

Oakland County Prosecutor Richard Thompson had requested a rehearing by the high court, which was denied. Thompson could not be

reached for comment, but has commented in the past on the judicial rulings, which he said cast at prosecutorial efforts in drug cases.

Franklin attorney William Wolfram, who has handled Schultz' appeal, said he has no firm expectations for the sentencing. "I know what I'll be arguing, but I don't know what to expect," he said.

Gage said she had already received more than 100 letters addressing Schultz' case. During his

1987 sentencing, she appeared troubled saying "I don't feel the sentence I'm imposing is a fair one. I have been concerned and troubled since the day of your conviction. There's nothing I can do. I'm duty-bound to follow that law."

Although Wolfram said the sentencing might be postponed to another day, court officials said Friday the sentencing was scheduled for Nov. 6 at 1:30 p.m.



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
