"As far as I'm concerned, the board will go ahead with its oncampus visits and select the new chancellor from the remaining two candidates," said Trustee Margaret A. MacTavish, secretary of the board.

In the meantime, Wiser, Hackett, MacTavish and board chairman Sandra L. Ritter are preparing to visit the Chicago area this weekend and the Dallas area. Nov. 15 and 16 to complete evaluations on the two remaining finalists.
