Balfour 57 boasts star studded cast

Ever since Sidney Silverman signed on as an active member of the Zionist Organization of America, he has been a participant on all levels including that of fund-raising.

This year "Balfour 57," the principal fund-raising vehicle of the Zionist Organization of Detroit will take place at 7:30 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 4, in Masonic Temple.

Silverman will be honored with the prestigious Justice Louis D. Brandeis Award for his service to Detroit ZOA, the national board; his contribution as co-chairman of Israel Projects; and his leadership as national ZOA president.

"It is the highest honor we can bestow," said his friend and colleague Zeke Leikin of Metro Detroit ZOA.

Arnold Michlin, a Farmington Hills resident, and a member of the ZOA board here, said Silverman is one of his heroes and a "great Zionist." Michlin hopes to help swell the audience for the Balfour 57 event and the bestowing of the Brandeis Award on Silverman.

Other Farmington area residents who are ZOA officers or board members, "crazy with work preparing for the concert," Michlin said, are Sid Brand, Mrs. Leonard Edelman, Patiline Kline, Rick Rosenhaus, George Rossman, Jack Shenkan, Stan Belzman, David Haron, Ron Schwartz, Mrs. Richard Kramer, Rabbi Efrey Spectre and Harry August.

As national president, Silverman has met with President George Bush and conferred with Israeli government leaders. He is married to the former Lillian Ginsburg. They have a son and two daughters and six grandchildren.

Irwin Green is general chairman of Balfour 57. The challenge, according to Silverman, is to fill the Masonic Auditorium which is one half again as large as the Ford Auditorium where previous events were held.

Ticket prices start at \$18 and \$25 and range to \$1,000.

WW II vet elected by Division Society

Charles D. King of Farmington Hills has just returned from Houston, Texas where the 3rd Infantry Division Society concluded its 71st annual reunion.

King was elected the society's national president and will remain in office for one year. He has been editing the society's official newsletter for the past 10 years.

King was wounded twice during the Anzio Beachhead campaign where he landed with the troops of the 6th Corp, Fifth Army 3rd Infantry Division. He stayed with them throughout the campaign until his wounds caused his evacuation to Naples.

The 3rd was formed in Camp Green, N.C. in 1917 and was the first American Troops to enter World War I. The division landed in North Africa on Nov. 8, 1942 and made landings in Sicily, two in Italy, and one in Southern France where it followed the Rhine River ending in Germany when the war ended covering some 531 days of front line combat.

The division also claimed the most casualties, the most Medal of Honors, including Audie Murphy the most decorated soldier of World War II who was in Co. B-15th Regiment.

The division also fought in Korea

as the troops that held the port open so the Marines that fought south from the Chosen Reservoir could evacuate the Chinese Train in North Korea.

The division known as "Rock of the Marine" from World War I, the Sturm Division (meaning storm) from WW II and are now stationed at Würzburg, West Germany as part of the NATO Forces there.
