# Cockroach, cat are charming

Billed as a back-alley opera but in fact a jazzy musical, the Theatre Guild of Livonia-Redford's "Archy and Mehitabel" is delightfully different and charming from beginning to end.

This offbeat little musical re-counts about the most fanciful love story imaginable — the whimsical tale of a cockroach (Archy) and his unrequited passion for a sexy alley cat (Mehitabel) on the steamy side of the big city in Shinbone Alley.

There is the barest of plots. And it requires a few moments to get into the spirit of things and accept humans cavorting about as insects and cate

for every line. And in the big city that means trouble.

A tryst with Big Bill, the local tomeat, leads to a litter of kittens. And Big Bill, played imposingly by Timothy Gerrard, brushes her off with a, "See you later."

Tyrone T. Tattersall, acting coach and seducer of stray cats, tells her to hit the street after she fails to under-stand the "inner rhythm" of Shake-speare. Don Piper is a bowl and in line voice as the frustrated maestro.

John Sartor gives a nice reading as the Newspaperman/Narrator. Perhaps a more Runyonesque quali-ty, however, would give the role an added dimension. added dimension.

Rare works highlight musical tour

The second part of a musical tour of Europe, offered recently by Chamberworks, was one trip that even an average person could afford. The event, which drew a respectable-sized audience, took place at the Guild Hall, Christ Church Cranbrook on Nov. 16.

To be sure, no local musical event could match an actual European tour. This program, however, presented by Chamberworks director Thomas Kuras and a small chamber group, provided an evening of adventure and learning, which is a good return for the modest ticket price. The group has two new violinists this season — Victoria Haltom and Mary Richards (with only Richards participating in the latest event). Other players were cellst Paul Willington, who has been with the group since its inception, and visiting artist Carol Perkins, flutist, who has performed with this group before.

MOST COMPOSERS on this program are virtually unknown. Among them were Henricus Albicastro, franz Xaver Richter and James Oswald, representing Switzerland, Moravia and Scotland, respectively. the other works were also new to most listence.

Many works from countries such as Sweden and Denmark are neglected. Kuras said, because marked scholars are unfamiliar with these languages and are less likely to do the necessary research.

WHILE THIS may be an obstacle, one could also contend, as I do, that these works aren't in the same league as those by more traditional composers. This doesn't after that, for the most part, these works provide enjoyable listening. With the illuminating background provided by Kuras, such a program becomes a stimulating venture and a

valuable learning experience, even if the music first on a par with the established masterpleces.
