It's hard to determine whether Puerto Rico is actually the para-dise island I remember it to be or if it was the tremendous consumption of well-aged rum known to the Puerto Ricans that somehow has blurred my memory.

Needless to say, a few rum drinks blended with tropical fruits in a tall glass sporting an umbrella is enough to send anyone off into the palm tree breezes of the Carib-bean and at least a few merry-making nights out.

For years, Puerto Rico has been a major exporter of rum. Last year, nearly 85 percent of the rum sold in the United States came from Puerto Rico.

I enjoyed several tours of various distilleries, which have a history all their own including pirate tales and origins of drinks. 
