Millage vote sparks lobbying efforts By Casey Hans stalf writer

Voters in the Farmington school district can expect to get plenty of information — pro and concluded Tuesday, Feb. 5. A parent group is planning its strategy for getting the millage passed, while one of Farm-ington Hills' target businesses — already on the record opposing the millage effort — plans to keep a high profile throughout the cam-paign.

Parent Carol Luckscheiter, co-chairwoman of a newly formed group called Friends of Farmington Schools, said her group will meet with parents from throughout the district this week to decide haw they will approach the public with information. A political action committee with the same name organized to help pass a bond issue for a new ofermentary school in 1988-83; Luckscheiter said it has not yet been decided if the group will form as a PAC. So far, she said, she's had a mixed reaction from the community about the two-proposal Parent Carol Luckscheite
