Salem wins with team balance

tem demonstrating to an opponent that stopping Jake Baker — at least attempting to do so — won't stop the Rocks. Salem had one of its most balanced scoring nights with four players scoring.

Baker was held to his lowest total of the season with 11 points, but 6-foot-5 teammate K.C. Kirkpatrick responded with a team-high 13 points. Baker also had 11 rebounds and 10 assists.

Demond Brown played a good defensive game against Baker, holding him to three field goals, and the River Rats collapsed on the Salem start time he had the ball near the basket.

"At times Jake was triple and quadruple teamed in the post," Brodies said. "But he was able to find the open player, and KC was able to get his opportunities."

Baker had one of his finest games in 1990, with 24 rebounds against Harp in the regional play-

but coach Harold Simmons knew stopping Baker wouldn't do the job entirely.

"I think any team would make a mistake if it just tried to stop him," he said. "He sees the play too well, and (the other players will) can it."

IN ADDITION to Baker and Kirkpatrick, guard Chris Tebben, who usually limited to playing the point guard, scored 13 points and 10 rebounds.

John Hoffmeyer, 5-foot-10 shooting guard, added eight.

"I'm not known for my shooting," Tebben said. "I'm getting better, but I'm still not a Mike Mulder player out there."

Hoffmeyer also cited the play of 6-foot-4 center Cliff Lee, who had nine rebounds and "took care of the basketball in key situations." Hoffmeyer and Mulder had six rebounds apiece.

Huron was minus 6-5 center David Amos, "who hasn't played since the 1980s," and 6-foot-10 center Mike

Huron guard Eric Culliver scored a game-high 17 points, which included 8-of-12 free throw shooting. Brown had 13 and guard Craig Thompson had 12.

The key in this game was our defense, not so much our ability to score," Brodie said, emphasizing the fact Salem held a team averaging 80-plus points to 50. "They were shooting 30 percent, and we were firing people at them."

TEBBEN Had probably the biggest basket of the game when he made a triple that gave the Rocks a 2-0 lead midway in the last quarter.

It came at a critical juncture and got Salem in a stronger position heading down the stretch. The important thing was to get the Rocks to take control of the game."

"He (Curtis Howard) was talking to me, telling me to shoot it," Tebben said. "I'm confident anyone on the team could make a shot in that situation and it happened to me."

"I felt we were getting stagnant at the end of the game. I didn't care if I scored or not. I just wanted to make something happen."

Knowing he isn't usually a scorer, Tebben said he didn't expect to be the hero. "I was just glad to shoot whenever he had the ball alone on the wing. He missed a couple try attempts earlier, but

was an advantage to come back early in the morning, when you sit out and look at the sun. I tell you, you want to be a part of it."

Salem moved in from 25-22 to 10 following a 22-22 tie at halftime, but the Rats ran off 10 unanswered points in the second half to close the perimeter shots and Brown came a triple.

But the Bucks responded with eight points in a minute to lead 33 33 33, and the game stayed close until Tebben's triple.

TO START THE rally, Mulder made a triple, and Kirkpatrick was hammering good to the basket. Culiver was given a technical foul for comment he made to Kirkpatrick that he was "a little bit of a nutcase." Mulder and Mulder one of the technical fouls. Hofmeijer's rebound basket gave Salem the lead.

The Rocks were three-point play after Kirkpatrick's three-point play put the team on top 35-34.

"I told the kids coming out on the matter how far you're up or down. It's not going to be over. It will depend on whether or not we can weather the storm," Brodie said.

The entire amount is payable from December 1, 1990 to February 14, 1991 without penalty.

Checks should be payable to: City of Farmington Hills and include the 10 digit parcel identification number located above the mailing address on the tax bill. Payment may be made at Farmington Hills City Hall, Treasurer's Office, 31555 West Eleven Mile Road during normal business hours, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday except for Monday, December 14, 1990, Tuesday, December 25, 1990, Monday, December 31, 1990 and Tuesday, January 1, 1991 when City Hall will be closed all day. **THE TOP PORTION OF THE TAX BILL MUST BE RETURNED WITH PAYMENT.** The bottom portion should be retained for your records.

For taxpayer convenience, payments may also be made at: National Bank of Detroit, Michigan National Bank, Manufacturers National Bank, or Metrobank. Or payment may be made via mail with the enclosed return envelope or through the City Hall night depository hours from the east wall of the front courtyard.

Payment made at the banks may be subject to a processing fee by the bank. Banks will accept payment until the close of business February 14, 1991.

Payments by mail, by law, are recorded on the date actually received not postmarked date. The City is not legally empowered to excuse delay or loss by the U.S. Postal Service. Payments received after February 14, 1991 are subject to a 4% penalty. Payments received after February 14, 1991 without sufficient penalty will be returned. Payments made after February 14, 1991 must be made to the City Hall or mailed to 31555 W. Eleven Mile Rd., Farmington Hills, Michigan 48334. Do not use the enclosed return envelope after February 14, 1991. If you pay by mail and desire a paid receipt other than your canceled check, please return both portions of the tax bill along with a stamped self-addressed envelope with your payment.

Checks are accepted as conditional payment. If returned by the bank, taxes are considered unpaid and subject to all penalties and interest. In addition there will be a \$30.00 fee charged for returned checks.
