### Pharmacist faces fraud trial

A Bloomfield Township phar-macist was ordered Wednesday to stand trial on fraudulent billing charges. Ramesh Gupta, 51, owner of Bloomfield Professional Pharma-

biomining Processional Flatman-raigned on Jan. 3 in Oakland County Circuit Court on seven counts of filing fraudulent health care claims.

The orders turned up on a Blue Cross sub-scriber's Blut. The subscriber no-tleed the unfamiliar drug charges and called the insurer's anti-fraud hotline in May 1989.

Biomfield Township Police De-partment conducted a joint inves-tigastion. Several Blue Cross sub-scribers, to whom charges were billed from the pharmacy, testi-lied during Gupla's preliminary examination before visiting Judge Carl Ingraham in 48th Dia-trict Court. Biomfield Township police. said the drugs that were not or-dered were odder to bills, along with drugs that were ordered. Po-lice said the fraud claims were worth about \$200 total. In June, police obtained a

In June, police obtained a search warrant and seized records covering Oct. 1988 to Dec. 1989.

Each count is punishable by up to four years in jail and a \$50,000 fine.
