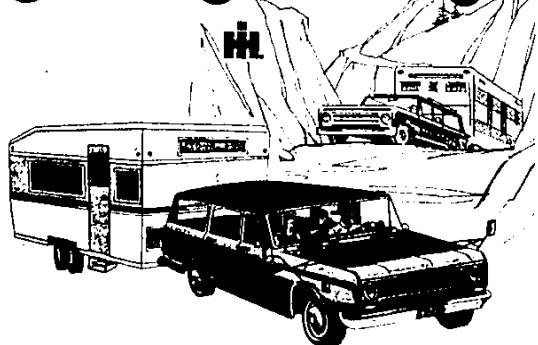


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bait a hook

What could be a better way to beat the blahs than to get out the old tackle box, clean a few lures and dream of the day when you can hit the open water?

Apparently a lot of Michigan fishermen not only dream about the sport during the dark of winter, but get a great deal of enjoyment from actual angling in the summer.

Lake Michigan's spectacular sport fishery produced a super season in 1970 as anglers took 884,000 trout and salmon from its Great Lakes and tributary waters, according to a preliminary estimate of the Department of Natural resources.

matic upswing from last year when Lake Michigan anglers caught an estimated 269,000 coho, 109,000 chinook, 93,000 lake trout, and 167,000 steelhead.

The DNR's preliminary estimates for 1970's sport-catch totals for Lake Superior are as follows: coho, 60,000; chinook, 7,000; lake trout, 180,000; steelhead, 40,000; and brown trout, 1,000.

Estimates of the lake's coho and chinook harvests are the same as for 1969. Figures are up from last year, covering the sport take of lake trout and steelhead from Lake Superior. In 1969, anglers

The figure, projected in relationship to results of a 1969 fisheries survey, far surpasses last year's sport-catch total for Lake Michigan, which was pegged at 638,000 trout and salmon. It also accounts for the bulk of the 1970 hook and line harvest from Michigan's Upper Great Lakes waters, estimated at 1,235,000 trout and salmon.

That total figure tops the 1969 mark by 265,000 trout and salmon, with Lake Michigan's output packing most of the difference.

The DNR's preliminary estimate, subject to possible refinements under a postcard survey of anglers, indicates that sport fisher-

men creel 288,000 coho, chinook, lake trout, steelhead, and brown trout from the state's Lake Superior waters. It also places Michigan's sport catch in Lake Huron at 63,000 fish for this year.

For Lake Michigan, the DNR's tentative fix on this year's sportfishing harvest includes 400,000 coho, 150,000 chinook, 125,000 lake trout, 204,000 steelhead, and 5,000 brown trout. These totals represent a dra-



took an estimated 172,000 lake trout and 37,000 steelhead in those waters of the state.

On the Lake Huron front, the DNR estimates that sport fishermen this season landed 40,000 coho, 3,000 chinook, and 20,000 steelhead. In 1969, they harvested 34,000 coho, 1,000 chinook, 1,000 lake trout, and 20,000 steelhead.
