

EMU Plans Tribute To Dr. King

"An Evening in Tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King Jr." is scheduled for Feb. 23 at Eastern Michigan University.

A three-hour documentary film, "King: A Filmed Record...Montgomery to Memphis," will be shown at 8 p.m. in Pease Auditorium. Admission is \$2.50 and it is hoped to raise \$2,500 to send to the Martin Luther King Foundation.

The foundation, which sponsors the King Memorial Center in Atlanta, supports a library-documentation project, the Institute of the Non-Violent Social Change and Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Park. The center, organized in 1969, is a creative community of black scholars, artists and organizers working toward a new humanity in America and the world.

The EMU "Evening in Tribute" is supported by numerous organizations on the campus coordinated by Charles Minneman, director of the Office of Religious Affairs, and Floyd Walton, undergraduate assistant in the office.

Farmington Grad Helps Drive Missionary Bus

A former Farmington resident is back at her mission work in Alpha after a jaunt to the farther-distant fields of South America.

She is Mrs. Dianne McCullough Martin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leon McCullough, 31581 Trestland, and a 1960 graduate of Farmington High School.

Mrs. Martin and her husband, Thomas, have been in Alpha four years under sponsorship of the Redford Church of Christ, working to establish a Church of Christ in that Lake Huron port town.

LAST FALL they joined the Rev. Gary Lutes, Church of Christ missionary to Chile, and his wife and daughters in driving a van-type bus from Dallas to Santiago, a distance of 10,000 miles along the Pan American Highway.

The Martins, who hope to be missionaries to South America, left their year-old son, Paul, with the McCulloughs in Farmington while they made the five-week trip to assist the Lutes. The van, donated to Rev. Lutes' mission by his sponsoring church in Jacksonville, Fla., was loaded with a

bed for the women, trunks, clothing, toys, fans, typewriters and cameras in addition to its six passenger.

MARTIN REPORTED that he had to unload and reload the van for customs officials at several borders, but the only thing confiscated was a bag of oranges "because you aren't allowed to take fresh fruit across the border."

The trip was by road all the way except from Southern Panama to northern Colombia.

"There was no road at all there, and we had to put the van on a boat and travel by water,"

Roads were best in Mexico, Chile and Peru, Martins reported, and worst in Costa Rica and Colombia. In Costa Rica, Martin said, they traveled a road with a sheer cliff dropping off to a raging river on one side and a sheer cliff going up on the other.

It was raining and pieces of the mountain kept falling off," he added.

"And when we drove through the mountains of Colombia at night we almost went over a cliff. It was foggy and we were driving

slowly and the road simply ended. It had been washed out by rain, but there was no warning of any kind. A makeshift detour took us around the washout."

THE COUPLE said they averaged 35 miles an hour during the five weeks of traveling and arrived at Santiago with only a few dents in the bus and all tires intact.

They stopped for a week in Bogota, Colombia, to attend the Pan American Lecture-series of the Churches of Christ in Latin America.

Aside from missing their son, they pronounced the trip fully successful. It may be a year or so before they can return to the area as missionaries, Martin said, "but we are definitely planning to go."

Diane Martin and her husband, who comes from Wayne, met while students at Michigan Christian College in Rochester. Both received degrees from the college. Martin in Bible studies and his wife in education.

Mrs. Martin worked in the National Bank in Farmington for a year between high school and college.

Presbyterian Leader Speaks In Farmington

George E. Bushnell, moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit, will speak at both services of the First Presbyterian Church of Farmington on Sunday, Feb. 28.

Bushnell, a prominent Detroit attorney, is one of the few laymen to serve as moderator in the Presbytery. In addition to his duties as moderator and elder in the Grossete Pointe Memorial Church, Bushnell is a member of the program board of the Division of Christian Life and Mission on the National Council of the Church of Christ in the U.S.A.

He also is a member of the council on evangelism of the Board of National Missions of the United Presbyterian Church. He served as a member of the selection panel for Presbyterian Graduate Fellowships of the United Presbyterian Church and is a member of the task force on the Church and Elementary and Secondary Education.

Bushnell was president of the Detroit Bar Association (1964-65); is a commissioner of the State Bar of Michigan; a fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers; a member of the International Society of Barristers and the

American and Federal Bar Associations.

In addition to his professional affiliations, he is a member of the American Civil Liberties Union; a life member of the N.A.A.C.P.; the Detroit chapter of the Industrial Relations Research Association; the Defense Research Institute; the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts, and Letters; and various Masonic orders. He has been honored as a 33rd degree Mason.

Other civic duties include membership on the boards of the American Arbitration Association, chairman of the Detroit Advisory Council, vice-president of the Community Health Association, and president of the Neighborhood Service Organization.

The speaker, whose father was George E. Bushnell, a former Supreme Court justice of Michigan, is a partner in the law firm of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone. He graduated from Highland Park High School in 1942 and from Amherst College in 1946. He received his L.L.B. from the University of Michigan Law School in 1951. He was on active duty in World War II (1943 - 46) and was commissioned in the Korean War (1951 - 53).

Footsore Teens Report On Trip

Washington and New York spelled lots of walking to two Churchill High School students who represented Newburg United Methodist Church at the 16th UN-Washington World Peace and International Affairs Seminar.

The two are Bill Kesling, a 12th grader, and Kathy Trost, who is in the 11th grade.

The trip was sponsored by the Detroit United Methodist Conference Boards of Christian Social Concerns and Missions and Church Extension. Its director was the Rev. Robert S. Davis of Holly, and it was open to 132 students.

In New York they saw the United Nations at work and were briefed by the Methodist Church's Board of Missions.

According to the Livonians, in New York they "walked their legs off and never knew Manhattan Island was so large."

In Washington they were to meet Rep. Jack McDonald but he was at a meeting when they arrived. They sat outside his office waiting. Curious office workers asked them what they were protesting.

They received briefings by the State Department and the Church's Board of Christian Social Concerns.

Inter-Faith Council Names New Officers

Albert J. Dunmore, director of the Office of Urban Affairs for the Chrysler Corp. and former officer of the "Michigan Chronicle," has been chosen president of the Interfaith Action Council for 1971.

Dunmore, who has been active in the council for several years, is a delegate from the Lutheran Church in America. As Interfaith's president, he succeeds Harley M. Selling, Ford Motor executive who is a delegate from the American Jewish Congress.

The new vice president is Robert G. Hoffman, head city planner of the Detroit City Plan Commission. He represents the Archdiocese of Detroit.

Interfaith Action Council was an outgrowth late in 1968 of the Interfaith Emergency Council, organized on the second day of the 1967 rioting as a city-wide relief operation.

The purpose of the council is "to serve as a more inclusive instrument through which the several religious and faith groups of metropolitan Detroit can more strongly unite in working together on common religious concerns, more wisely develop the use of resources, and more creatively respond to the needs of man."

THE 15-MEMBER group includes the Archdiocese of Detroit, the Jewish Community Council, the American Jewish Committee, the American Jewish Congress, the Anti-Defamation League, and 10 Protestant bodies: African Methodist Episcopal, Church of the Brethren, Congregational, Detroit Association of Christian Churches (Disciples), Episcopal, Lutheran Church in America, Metropolitan Detroit Council on Churches, United Church of Christ, United Methodist and United Presbyterian.

The Communication Center for the council is now at 600 Palms Building, in the new headquarters of the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches.
