Headlee ads are unfair to schools

The dispertisement of iticiaria headles directed against the Farmington Public School System presented a district wire of the properties of district's financial health. By not presenting the whole story, he is not being fair to the voters in this district. The chart in his ad summarized the financial situation at the end of the fiscal year. WHILE THE increase in expenditures has outpaced the rate of inflation, reasons for the increase exist:

• Employee benefits — These costs for all employees have sky-rocketed over the past five years; This was a problem nationwide, not just for Farmington schools, in one of those years insurance costs increased 30 percent.

• Capital expenditures — When the bond issue was defeated in September 1988, the district began to use operating money for much needed building repairs and renovations.

• Two additional elementary schools - Highrneadow and Hill-side were opened to relieve over-rowding, in the elementary schools. The operating costs re-quired to run these two elementa-ry schools increased the budget.

• Technology - The Technology Advisory Committee has been used to be the properties of the properties of the theory appropriate hardware and software to the students and teachers of the district. Upgrading technology is, in my view, necessary to compete with the standards set nationally and internationally for technological prowess.

Finally, the figures for student enrollment were misleading while the overall student count in the district has increased only 5 percent reflecting a temporal decrease in the numbers of high school students, enrollment in the elementary schools has increased dermanuteally over the past five "cars. Those are the students whom the district must educate during the next decade.
