FRED D. LEONHARD

Mr. Leonhard, 92, of West Bloomfield, formerly of Southfield, died Jan. 29 in Orchard Lake Rest Haven. Born in St. Ignace, Mr. Leonhard received a Life Certificate in teaching from Michigan Normal and bachelor of arts and master of arts degrees from the University of Michigan. He was head of the science department at Central and Mackenzie High schools. He also was assistant principal at Bedford High School and principal of Western

High School where he retired in 1963 after a 44-year career in education. Mr. Leonhard served as president of the Southfield school board for 13 years, and was a member of the Oakland County school board for 17 years. He was honored in 1965 by having an elementary school named for him by the city of Southfield. He was a member of the City Charter Commission of Southfield and was the charter president of Southfield Optimist Club as well as a state officer of that organization for one year. He also served as city historian of Southfield.

Survivors include his son, Robert, daughters, Frances Kernkamp and Barbara McLean of Farmington Hills, six grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Burial was in Petoskey, Mich., beside his wife, Elizabeth. Memorials may be made to the Southfield Historical Society or the Leonhard Elementary School PTA of Southfield.

Arrangements were made by the Haley Funeral Directors, Southfield.

Charles Chuba and Adam Corbin of Farmington Hills are nominees for the Air Force Academy.

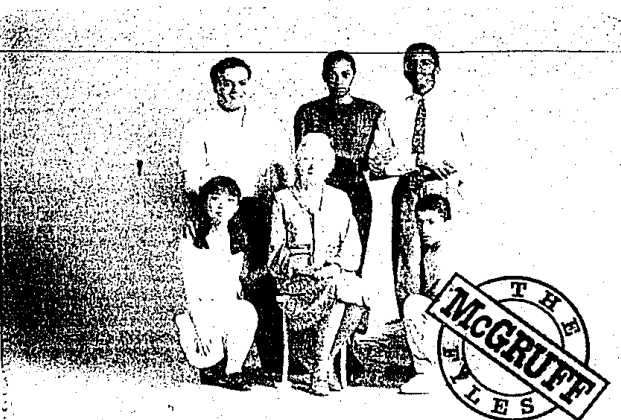
John Cowan from Farmington Hills is the nominee for the Naval Academy.

All appointments will be made by April 30.



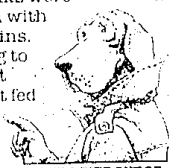
