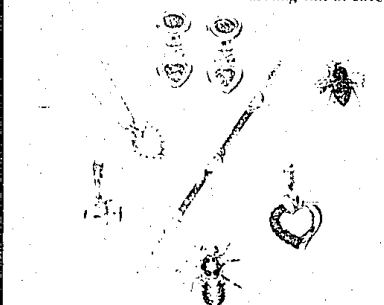

DECREASING DUST EXPOSURE

Dust Mites, which are microscopic insects related to spiders, are present in homes to some degree. They feed on tiny bits of dead skin commonly known as dander. The source of this dander comes from animals as well as humans. While they are not dangerous to humans, they are a major cause of a wide range of allergic symptoms varying from stuffy nose or itchy eyes to asthma, hives, headaches and asthma.

It is important to decrease the exposure to mites by minimizing their breeding areas such as keeping the humidity in your home at 20% or lower and help because mites thrive in high humidity. There are also other specific cleaning and isolation measures such as using a high quality vacuum and special bed covers, and vacuum cleaners to decrease mite populations thereby preventing mite allergy symptoms and chronic allergies such as asthma.
