

Cops buckle down on law

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"We've done a good conscious effort to encourage the (adult) occupants of vehicles to wear restraining. But we haven't done a lot with children. We haven't emphasized it quite enough," Cranston said.

The "tougher" regulations—have come about as a matter of good sense rather than the result of a dramatic increase in child injuries. In Farmington Hills in 1990, accidents decreased 5 percent while injuries decreased 20 percent. "This is going to be a hard item to sell," Cranston

said.

WHILE OFFICERS are trained for the new regulations, the city ordinance will be changed to reflect the new laws.

Bruce Madson, executive director of the Traffic Improvement Association, believes there will be little problem getting kids to buckle up. "I hear that a majority of adults buckle up because their kids have cajoled them."

Police can't stop you only for having kids older than 4 and younger than 16 unbuckled. But they can if a child aged 1-4 is not in a child re-

straint seat in the car's front seat. Police can also stop you if a child 1-4 years of age is unbuckled in the back seat. And they can stop you if they say your child is obstructing your view by standing up in the front or back seat.

"If I see a child standing up in the back seat and I think he is less than 4, I've got a basis for a primary stop," Cranston said.

And don't forget...Cranston said that you can be ticketed if you are not wearing your seat belt properly. But you have to be stopped for another violation first.

Downtown project re-phased

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project may come in slightly higher than the budgeted \$1.1 million, Strip-Sittsamer said.

BUDGETS FOR each of the new phases are currently being worked out. The new project phases call for:

- Resurfacing the large municipal lot downtown, and making streetscape improvements along Grove Street, on the south side of

- Phase V in the fiscal year 1991-92 would redo the Farmington/State Street parking lot and make streetscape improvements along State Street. This may be bid out with the previous phase, as they are being done in the same year.

- In 1992-93, the final phase will

complete the project by making streetscape improvements along Orchard and Thomas streets and coordinate downtown signage.

The DDA board plans to keep an eye on Thomas Street—which runs parallel to Grand River Avenue one block north—in case any property goes up for sale and to consider landscaping options in the area.

The DDA also decided to drop the idea of building a crossing structure across Grand River as part of the project.
