

Christian College Planned In Area

Plans were announced this week to locate a Christian college in Farmington Township to serve students of all denominations from the Detroit metropolitan area.

The John Wesley College is scheduled for construction on a 50-acre parcel on Nine Mile west of Farmington Road.

COLLEGE PRESIDENT Kenneth Armstrong describes the proposed Farmington campus as "a revolutionary concept in education, one that will bring the influence of Christian thinking back to the universities."

The concept is called "co-operative education" because it involves location of a private religious college near state universities so the students can attend both.

The Farmington campus will contain dormitories, social facilities, a library, and classical and contemporary religious instruction. But the campus will not offer a degree.

THE STUDENT will take his major academic study at the university of his choice but still be able to enroll at the John Wesley College.

At this private school, the student can take "value-oriented" subjects such as philosophy, ethics and history of religion. Classes taken at

Wesley College will be fully accredited and will be applicable toward the student's university degree, Armstrong adds.

In addition, the Farmington campus will provide a place for the student to study, social functions and open facilities for all religions.

"THIS is an idea that will bridge the gap between the private and the public institution. It is an idea that takes the best of both and brings them together," says Armstrong.

"At a time when America desperately needs the strong guiding hand of religion, the influence of the small religious college is fading. Today, 72 per cent of college students attend state-supported schools. Soon it will be 80 per cent, then 90 per cent."

"These mammoth institutions are outstanding in their ability to teach astro-physics and cost accounting, but they are unable to give the moral leadership and religious guidance that is so necessary."

THE COLLEGE, open to all denominations, will emphasize Christian and democratic values and their roles in life.

The fundamental philosophy of the John Wesley College, Armstrong adds, is "great emphasis on individual responsibility in the world, the value of the free market economy, the need for united government, and the obligation inherent in the God-given rights of man."

Religious colleges may be declining, Armstrong explains, because they are trying to compete with state universities. They are pricing themselves out of the market because they cannot hope to compete with tax supported colleges in facilities, faculties or libraries.

Armstrong, chairman of the board of the John Wesley Foundation, says the college has already hired eight full-time faculty members and eight part-time. He expects construction will be completed in time to enroll 100 students this September.

Armstrong, 43, has a master's in philosophy and two doctorates, one in higher education and the other in philosophy of religion. He is a former missionary, college administrator and minister.

Just recently, he stepped down as minister of the Detroit First Church of the Nazarenes, a Unitarian church, to administer the John Wesley College.



FISH Program To Begin April 1, Needs Volunteers

A new service designed to help others in need and give them the chance to be "fishers of men" begins in Livonia during this Lenten period.

The program, Fish for Livonians, will get underway April 1 under the sponsorship of 18 Livonia churches.

Other churches are invited to join in the help program that takes its name from the symbol used to identify early Christians.

UNDER THE PLAN, a 24-hour service will be available for any residents in need of emergency service such as babysitting, shopping, cooking, housework, transportation or yard work such as snow removal.

Other services such as companionship for the elderly, teen-adult counseling, referral service, reading to the blind also will be available.

BASICALLY, this is how FISH works:

A person in need calls the FISH phone number which is a 24-hour answering service. The answering service takes the person's phone number and calls the "fish for the day" volunteer.

This "fish for the day" phones back the person in need, finds out the necessary information and dispatches the person from his volunteer list who can help.

Members from 18 Livonia churches form the present steering committee.

Chairman Armand Vigna, of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, hopes members from Livonia's other 30 churches and community organizations will soon add their support. Five working committees are publicists, speakers bureau, maps and street guides, training programs, and volunteers.
