2. What's your route? One flight to one city in one day is the norm for international flying, but for domestic flying it is not unusual to fly to five different cities on the

same day.

Routes are subject to change monthly, but the more scoling you are, the more consistently you can hold the same route. My routes have taken me all around the U.S., to Europe and Japan.

3. How much time do you get off? The physical demands of coping with an extremely erratic schedule are justified by the amount of time off we get. An average of 15-20 days off a month, usually not consecutive, is typical mer of the bling gone all the area. 
