

## Cornwell paces Harrison victory

Farmington Hills Harrison won three relays and six individual events Thursday to defeat Northville 74-54 and register the lone victory in girls track among the three city schools.

Kristi Cornwell won the 300-meter hurdles in 50.6 and was on two winning relays. Teammates Jessica Johnson, Heather Conley, Susan Glowacki and Jana Pidskalny were on two relays each.

In the field events, Harrison's Becky Karbowksi won the shot put (29-2) and Denee Pinal the discus (82-6). Colleen Heinemann captured the 100 hurdles in 17.2, Katie McAskin the 800 run in 2:42.3 and Jill Murany the 3,200 run in 13:26.

Conley, Glowacki, Johnson and Pidskalny ran the 400 relay in 54.8, and Cornwell joined Conley, Glowacki and Pidskalny on the 800 unit, which had a 1:57 time.

The Hawks also won the 1,600 relay with Becky Pears, Johnson, Melanie Hankola and Cornwell finishing in 10:55.1.

EMILY SHIVELY won two races for North Farmington, but the Raiders were on the losing end of an 85-43 score Thursday with visiting Westland John Glenn. Shively ran the 1,600 run in 6:02.8 and the 3,200 run in 12:39.5.

North's Jenny Web also had two firsts, with one coming in a relay. She finished the 800 run in 2:25.2 and anchored the 3,200 relay, which included Tracy Mitchell, Lisa Wankock and Amy Roberts. The Raiders had an 11:01 time.

The 800 relay team of Stacey Weisenfeld, Heather Armistead, Karl Pavelich and Maya Gansara had the only other first place for North, winning that race in 1:58.4.

Glenn had triple winners in Amy Finley, who won the high jump (4-8), the high hurdles (17.7) and the intermediate hurdles (51.1), and Lynette Conner, who won the long jump (14-3), the 100 dash (13.7) and the 200 dash (28.3).

Cathy Riley won the shot put (27-4) and the discus (88-4) for the Raiders. Glenn's other winners were Kim Springer in the 400 run (1:56.7), the 400 relay team (58.1) and the 1,600 relay squad (4:37.1).

BEHIND THREE-event winners Tonya Wheeler and Stacey Withoff, Salem was able to best Farmington's effort Thursday, winning the dual meet 75-48 at Salem.

In individual events, Wheeler won the high jump (4-8) and the 400 dash (1:02.4). She also teamed with Withoff, Theresa Glacherio and Cyndi Platter to win the 1,600 relay (4:30.1). Withoff won the 1,600 run (5:55.0) and the 800 run (5:37.3).

Glacherio also captured the 300 hurdles (51.0). Salem's Dana Driscoll jumped 15-1/4 to take the long jump, and Emily Farrell won the 3,200 run in 12:31.3.

Key Rogers won two dash events — the 100 (13.5) and the 200 (28.0) — for the Falcons. Farmington's other winners included Deanna Curcio in the discus (88-8), Becky Washcock in the shot put (32-2/4) and Shelli Gaul in the high hurdles (16.4).

## City teams struggle in dual meets

Farmington teams were shut out in boys track and field Thursday as all three dropped their first division dual meets.

Northville defeated Harrison 82½-54½ in the Western Division of the Western Lakes Activities Association. Westland John Glenn dominated North Farmington 115-22 in the Lakes Division, and Plymouth Salem breezed past city champion Farmington 88-38.

Harrison's Tony Shalew was a double winner with victories in the shot put (50-4) and the discus (140-6). Dave Gletzer won the pole vault (10-0) and Roy Granger the 100-meter dash (11.1).

The Hawks had a pair of first-place distance runners. Jason Zdyrski won the 1,600 run in 4:57 and Mike Deans the 3,200 run in 11:09.9.

Northville swept the relays with times of 46.3 in the 400, 1:34.9 in the 800, 3:59.4 in the 1,600 and 8:53 in the 3,200.

SALEM'S ANDY ROJEKSI was a triple winner, and Rob Casler had two first places. The Falcons had double winners in Joe Miller and Ben Goba.

"I think our kids did a great job," Salem coach Gary Balconi said. "We feel pretty confident, up and down the lineup, that we don't have any weaknesses. We lost to some good kids (Goba and

Miller), but we were close behind."

Rojeski won the 200 dash in 23.6 and the 400 run in 52.9, and he also anchored the 800 relay team, which included Joe Nunee, Jake Baker and Mike Richards. The Rocks had a 1:36 time.

Casler led a Salem sweep in the shot put and the discus. He threw the shot 47-5 and the discus 137-8. Steve Batog was second in both events and Brian Schumacher third.

Salem's Leon Hister won the long jump at 20-4 and also was the leadoff runner on the 400 relay. Matt Perron was first in the 100 dash in 11.4 and was the anchorman on the 400 relay.

John Thomas broke the tape at the end of the 800 run and started Salem on its way to a victory in the 3,200 relay.

Todd Forbes and Jim Ramsay combined with Hister and Perron for a 46.0 time in the 400 relay, and Joe Pawluszka, Derek Cudini and Mike Patterson followed Thomas in the 3,200 with the Rocks finishing in 8:49.5.

Nunee also took the lead on the 1,600 relay with Baker, Pawluszka and Jamie Miller following him. Salem had a 3:42.2 time.

Farmington's Miller ran 14.9 in the high hurdles and 42.7 in the intermediate hurdles. Salem's Ramsay was second in the 110s and Don Johnson third, and that order was reversed in the 300s.

Goba won the 1,600 run with a 4:41.6 time and the 3,200 run with a 10:28.4 time. Steve Boudreau of Salem was second in the 1,600 at 4:42.6.

NORTH'S ONLY first place came from Todd Pawlowski, who won the shot put with a toss of 45-5/4.

Glenn double winners were Andrew Hodge in the high hurdles (18.3) and the intermediate hurdles (44.7), Randy Seach in the 100 and 200 dashes with times of 11.2 and 23.3 and Joe Rajewski in the 1,600 and 3,200 runs with respective finishes of 4:56.4 and 11:09.8.

Other winners for the Rockets (3-0) were Jason Key, discus (139-5); Bill Griffiths, high jump (6-0); Brandon Buck, long jump (20-0); Tony Donnelly, pole vault (10-0); Jason Nowicki, 400 run (53.4); and Bob Lulek, 800 run (2:17.2).
