child's meals, bedtimes, medication, altergies, care of pets and rules for TV, and visitors should always be discussed and put down on paper.

A brief tour of the home should be conducted to point out all exits, first aid supplies, fire extinguisher, flashlight, clothes, bedding and any special hazards in the home.

A BABY SITTER must always be

awate of possible safety hazards in the borne. Children should be kept away from stoves, cooking appliances, open stairways, open windows, heat-ers and radiators, tablecloths, elec-trical cerds and outlets. Irres and Irreplaces, cords on venetian blinds, painting and cleaning supplies, guns and arimmention

Be sure to check on children regu-

larly to be certain they aren't play-ing with sharp objects, clgarettes or matches, medicines, bot liquids, dishes or glassware, plastic bag, small objects such as buttons, beads

small objects such as buttons, beads and nuts, or strange animals. While outdoors with children, always hold the child's hand when crossing streets, shopping, walking or visiting. Never leave a small child alone outdoors, not even for amoment. Stay away from possible perils such as swimming poots, wells, holes and construction areas.
