Pintar and Rainko are concerned about the effect the rule will have on the quality of coaching and the ability of the league to attract qualified people.

"They want to safeguard the children — and I have no problem with that — but it's so hard to get good baseball coaches." Rainko said. "Putting a baseball cap on somebody and sending them out there doesn't make him a coach."

"I don't think the board gave it enough thought as to how it would affect the program, especially when you get above the 12-year-old level," Pintar said. "At that age level, base-ball is fun but it's also competitive."
