



"He encouraged young people and it was a nice thing to see," Burnett said. "My aunt, Marie Walling, wrote a book of poetry called 'Bit O' Life.' Levinson encouraged her. He published articles about her and ran a poem every week on the editorial page."

Mr. Levinson was a pioneer in the broadcast industry, founding WCAR in 1939. He operated the station until the early 1950s. He was a member of the National Association of Broadcasters.
