## New books focus on wildflowers

Four new books on wild list of good things to read: wildflowers top this month's

Two books by Henry W. Art (Garden Way, th paperback) are excellent. The first, "Garden Wildflowers, 101 Native Species . . . . How to row Them" (\$12.95), deals with plants from all er this country.

Grow Them (11.2.3), uears wan passed.

It is in its fifth printing. Each line drawing is accompanied by excellent botanical descriptions, some historical facts and informations such as growing needs and propagation methods. Names of plants that grow in like canditions are given, while the charts list bloom time, height and color, a tremendous help when choosing wild plants for a home garden.

The second, "The Wildflower Gardener's

a tremendous help when choosing wild plants for home garden. "The Wildflower Gardener's Guide" [411,95], pertains to the northeast, mid-Atlantic, Great Lakes and eastern Canada. The format is the same as the first one and this too, is excellent. It received a Quilt & Trowel award from the Garden Writers of America Inc., soil pli requirements, weather and rainfall information. A bonus is the gallery of color photes. The glosseries in both are a great help to amadeur botanists. • "How to Know the Wildflowers," Mrs. William Starr Dana (Houghton Mifflin, 312,95 paper), was first published almost 100 years ago, but it still viable. We are privileged to peek into the 19th century and read her lyrical descriptions of these flowers.

Seito make a nice addition to the line drawings to help make identification casier. Plants are listed in alphabetical order by color.

• "Wildflower Foklore," Laura C. Martin (The Globe Piquot Press, 323.95, cloth) "reaches out from the shelf" with lis delicate basket of flowers on the cover. Each of the 105 plants found readily in the wild are depicted with line drawings.

Where and when to find them, how to grow them, and all botanical information is included. The book was written because Martin discovered when she took tourists on wildflower walks while working as a teacher/naturalist at Calaway Gardens in Georgia, they were more interested in the ore and legend of the plants than their growing hablis, etc.
