The good news is that there is a bumper crop of new pledges — 22 all told who come from throughout the metro area — willing, able, and enthusiastic to start working on the annual Goodwill Antiques Market, the fund-raising mainstay of the group.

Getting ready for the antique show and sale is a 12 month commitment for all members of the group.
