Double Bomb Blast Shakes Campus At Orchard Ridge

Explosion Interrupts **Provost Press Session**

Two bombs exploded at 12:15 p.m. Friday, in hallway. Estimates of damage to the lab equip-the empty biology lab in Building C of the Orchard Ridge Campus of Oakland Community College. No one was injured.

Farmington Township police were quickly called to the campus, and at 1:15 p.m. the campus dows and sent a bomb through a narrow was closed and buildings evacuated.

FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP Police Chief Irving Yakes said that one student was entering the lab when he heard a "hissing noise" and ran out just prior to the explosion. No one was in the lab at the

time. Yakes said the bombs apparently had been planted in the laboratory and then a fuse was iit. It was reported that nails were used as shrapnel. A State Police bomb squad was called to the cambra. Yakes eaid pus, Yakes said.

Yakes said police "have some witnesses and twe some suspects."

Orchard Ridge Provost S. James Manilla said

or the Federal Bureau of Investigation was also on the campus to investigate the bombings. He added that the investigators for North Central Association, an accrediting agency, had left the campus prior to the explosions.

TWO FRESHMAN students, Pete Martens and Frank Roebuck, said that as they were leaving the student activities (J) building, when they saw what they thought was a bomb in the fire extinguisher case which they reported to the police. Police were checking reports that other bombs were planted on the campus.

It was not known whether Friday's trouble was related to incidents that took place on the campus earlier in the week.

More than 20 black students and administrators

More than 20 black students and administrators from Oakland Community College's three campuses charged police harassment and took action on 12 student demands Wednesday. In a five-hour meeting Wednesday, administrative provosts and representatives patched differences with the leadership of the Association of Black Students and arrived at "workable solutions" to the black student demands.

During the session black students brought we

During the session, black students brought up recent incidents where they said the police had searched their cars and took their names and pictures on the previous day.

"EVERY CAR with two or more blacks coming off campus was stopped. The police searched the cars and went through the trunks," Henry Fry, member of the ABS, said after the meeting. Fry said police told them they were investigating rumors that blacks were coming on campus with weapons.

"But the hang-up is that they (the placks) were leaving campus" when the cars were searched, he

Farmington Township Police Chief Irving Yakes denied that police searched any of the ve-hicles. But he said police did ask the occupants for identification.

"Our department had received reports of persons coming onto the campus with chains and concealed weapons, but we did not search the cars," he said.

Township police took license plate numbers of cars leaving after Monday's disturbance, Yakes said. On Monday, an estimated 16 black students toppled cafeteria tables and six white students were injured.

One student, Thomas Pickens, 20, was hospital-


WHEN SOME of the same cars returned to campus Tuesday, they were stopped by police "to see if the persons involved in Monday's activities were students attending the Orchard Ridge campus or outsiders." Yakes said.

Fry said that a few black people that he could not identify as students were among the 16 involved in the trouble.

Black students also charged that the ignition wires in four of their cars were disconnected Tuesday by the police. Yakes denied the charge. Tentative solutions to the black students' demands were arrived at Wednesday including plans to replace black faculty members with other qualContinued on Page 3A,
