Form of Petition

If after checking the nominations and determining the results it shall appear that there are less than two candidates for any office it shall be the duty of the Commission to complete the ballot by adding such names as may be necessary, as herein-after provided, so that when the ballot shall be placed before the electors there shall be not less than two candidates for each and every office to be voted on at such election.

Section 17. In all matters pertaining to elections in the City, the City shall be governed by the general election law of this State, as the same now or hereafter may exist, and in so far as the same now is or hereafter may be applicable to the City, and

CHAPTER VI

Initiative.
Section 1. Any proposed ordinance may be submitted to the Commission by petition signed by at least twenty-five per cent of the total number of qualified electors. All petition papers, circulated
