One thing you learn while going to college on shipboard, reports Redford Township student Carla Schlosser, is that all over the world "people want to do nice things for you."

It was really the best part of the four-month study trip to Europe, Africa, South America and Mexico, said the Michigan State University senior, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O.D. Schlosser.

From Oct. 10 to Jan. 29, Carla sailed aboard the S.S. Ryndam as a student of Chapman College's World Campus Afloat.

THE DUTCH ship took her and more than 300 other students to 14 ports during the nearly four months.

"And at every stop we seemed to meet people who wanted to do something extra to be sure we had a good time," she said.

"In London, for instance, there was a former member of the Palace Guard who took about a dozen of us on a tour around the city just because he enjoyed talking to visitors to his city."

She said the American students figured at first that their benefactors wanted to be paid, but always learned this wasn't so.

"They just wanted to show us their city," she added.

Carla, who is a journalism major at Michigan State, said she first heard of the Campus Afloat program about the time it started in 1965.

"I happened to see a catalog, and decided right then to go," she said. "My parents didn't find out about it until last year, though."

BUT MR. AND MRS. Schlosser agreed it would be a good graduation present, so Carla took off on the tour that included stops at London, Amsterdam, Barcelona, Athens, Dubrovnik, Yugoslavia; Rome, Funchal, Madi-

era; Freetown, Sierra Leone; Rio de Janeiro, Salvador, Brazil; Port of Spain, Trinidad; Cartagena, Colombia; Panama City and Acapulco.

"We had classes every day at sea except Sunday," Carla said. "You would take two A and two B classes, and each one met every other day."

She carried 12 hours of studies, including travel-related courses like cultural anthropology, social psychology, urban and rural sociology and emerging nations.

At each stop there was a practicum, an organized tour of such spots as housing projects and social welfare agencies.

"You had to take that tour," Carla said, "but be Athens, Dubrovnik, Yugoslavia; Rome, Funchal, Madi-

"At most of the stops, the college arranged for us to visit with specific families for meals. Some of these families invited us to be house guests, too."

CARLA FOUND the whole trip fascinating, but marked as highlights a side journey to Florence, part of the Rome stop, a special excursion to Berlin and past the Berlin wall into the East sector of the city, and a trip through a primitive jungle trail to the settlement of Kuni Indians in Panama.

"At that point we found it hard to believe we were really going to school and getting credit for all the fun," she said.

Florence is the city where she'd like to return for more study, Carla said, but Trinidad was the happy stop where she'd go back for a vacation.

Carla visited for a week in New York before leaving on the voyage, and had a week in Los Angeles when she returned.

"So I'm really going to have to come down to earth when I go back to finish up my senior year," she said.

Classes Begin April 5 At YW

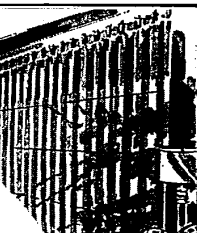
