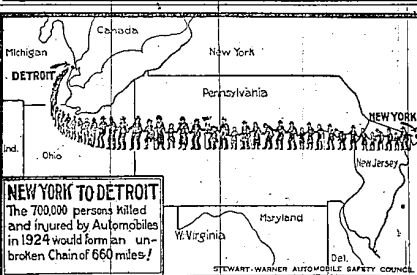

Caravan of Death 660 Miles
Long Is Nation's Auto Story



NEW YORK TO DETROIT
The 700,000 persons killed and injured by automobiles in 1924 would form an unbroken chain of 660 miles!

A CARAVAN of death and suffering 660 miles long is what the annual automobile casualties of the United States would form if placed in one continuous line. From New York to Detroit, painful mile on painful mile, this ghastly and pathetic human chain would reach. This graphic picture prepared by the Stewart-Warner Safety Council for the prevention of automobile accidents, tells its own story. Twenty-two thousand killed annually by automobiles and 600,000 injured (the present toll caused) by thoughtless drivers and careless pedestrians. Only a small per cent of the accidents are due to defects in the cars or can rightly be called unavoidable.

"EVERYBODY LOSES WHEN TIMBER BURNS"
The Michigan Press Association through its member papers and by means of animated picture signs is fostering an extensive campaign to aid the state in educating citizens and tourists to the importance of watchful care in avoiding forest fires.
Defeating forest fires not only affect the owners of timber but indirectly every business interest and property owner in the state.
Specially prepared advertisements, placed in all papers which are members of the Michigan Press Association, will reach the people in every locality of the state and forcibly impress upon them the serious results of forest fires.
The Scene-In-Action Corporation will place in hotel lobbies—particularly along tourist routes—schools and other places where people congregate, a scene depicting a ravaging forest fire. In this "Scene-In-Action" picture the flickering of the flames flare and sink as though actually fanned by the breeze, lighting on the surrounding landscape with vivid, colorful flashes. The smoke rolls upward exactly as it would do in nature, now whirling in mad spirals, now floating serenely. Only the heat and crackle of flames are wanting to make the illusion perfect.
This part of the campaign will reach the resort tourists, many of whom are visiting the state for the first time, little realizing that a careless toss of a lighted match or an unquenched camp fire may start a conflagration of inestimable loss.
This picture confronting them in every hotel lobby along their route cannot but make a strong and lasting impression upon them. Only the vandal deliberately destroys property.

Wonderful Machinery
Present-day bottle-filling machines have a capacity of automatically filling, sealing and labeling from 30 to 120 bottles a minute. They not only fill each container exactly to a predetermined height, but also automatically skip and refuse to fill bottles that are badly cracked or broken or have blowholes. They fill properly with any liquid and also with semi-liquids, such as sirups, catsup, chili sauce, salad dressing, horseradish, olives and so forth.

Thrill Well Rewarded
The saving of little tickets thrown aside by passing motorists may make John G. Jeffers, sixty-five-year-old "newsboy," richer by \$1,900. He sells papers where motorists, ferrying between San Francisco and Oakland, Cal., have to pay toll, and it was a poor day when he did not receive a handful of rebate tickets. 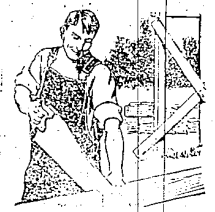
