

## MICHIGAN AT WORK

## MICHIGAN HEAVY EXPORTER

Average Monthly Foreign Sales Exceed Those of Most Neighboring States



Michigan is one of the leading states in America's export trade. Each day boats and trains haul from the state goods destined for every quarter of the globe.

Several factors explain Michigan's preeminence in this respect. The state borders Canada, which is one of the good foreign customers of the United States, and Canadians naturally turn to Michigan for many of their needs.

The automobile, of which Michigan is the first producer, is taking a place of growing importance in our exports, so that American motor cars now dominate the world markets.

Probably the greatest factor is the diversity of Michigan products both in industry and agriculture.

Department of Commerce figures show that Michigan exports average \$15,421,000 in value each month. Ohio's exports average \$11,276,000 a month, although Ohio is a more populous state than Michigan. Illinois exports are slightly ahead of those of Michigan, being \$19,310,000 monthly. Michigan exports are far ahead of all other neighboring states, being about twice those of Wisconsin and more than three times those of Indiana.
