Gets MTU Doctorate

Donald L. Sowers of Farmington has earned a doctor of philosophy degree in engineering mechanics from Michigan Technological University in Houghton.

Sowers is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis M. Sowers of 38810 State St. He and his wife Nora have been residing in Houghton.

Sowers graduated from Farmington High School in 1955 and received a bachelor of science degree in engineering physics from Michigan Tech in 1959. Earlier he attended the University of Michigan and Lawrence Institute of Technology.

He received a master of science degree in mechanics from the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in 1963. He has been employed by the Pratt and Whitney Aircraft Co. and by the Lewis Research Center of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. He also has served as an assistant professor in the Lorain County Community College in Ohio.

He returned to Michigan Tech in 1966 and has served as an instructor in engineering mechanics. His graduate study has been supported in part by the Traineeship Program of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. The title of his doctoral dissertation is "Instability of Prestressed Circular Plates - The Circular Saw Problem."


