PLANS COMPLETED FOR

Y. M. C. A. CAMPS

This summer promises to be the greatest camping season in the history according to Robert D. Lower, secretary of the Lower Oakland County Y. M. C. A., who announced today that plans had been completed for the usual camps operated under the auspices of the association here.

Four camps are available for local boys and men. Camp Ohryssa on Fish Lake near Milford with Roger H. Friend, who comes back for the seventh year as director. George Relyea will be swimming director. A camp doctor will be on the staff and the big new club house will be a special attraction this year. This camp is open to boys from 11-17 years of age. Nearly 800 were enrolled last year and it is expected that between 75 and 100 will attend from this section this summer.

Camp Nissokene, the northern camp situated on Lake Van Etten near the Au Sable River, about 200 miles north of Detroit with a large estate forest reserve adjoining the camp grounds is a wonderful place for boys. Nissokene, due to the gift of the late Phillip H. Gray of Detroit, is one of the best equipped boys camps in the country. Equipment includes 25 lodges, a large club house, a dining hall, the big tower, hospital lodge, cement tennis courts, baseball diamond, fine swimming beach, boats, canoes and many other attractions.

There is a summer school for the boys who wish to make up credits, remove conditions or study special subjects. Boys between the ages of 11 and 17 may make out application for this camp.

Camp Hayo-Went-Ha on the shores of Old Torch Lake, operated by the State Y. M. C. A., is considered one of the most beautiful camps in the state. The camp site of 330 acres includes a shore line of one and one-half miles of fine white sand beach. The boys live in tents with wood floors. A large club house and a rustic dining lodge, creel boats, tennis courts, athletic fields, make the camp very attractive. Boys between the ages of 12 and 16 may make application for this camp.

For the men a very fine camp is Phillip H. Gray camp, located on Lake Van Etten. Swimming, fishing, golfing, hiking and canoe trips and other sports and recreational features make this a very wonderful place for a man to spend a vacation.

All of these camps open about the first of July and continue through to the first of September.

All over the United States, Mr. Lynd said, similar preparations are under way. It is as follows:
Number C-1-25.
An Ordinance providing for the Abatement and Prevention of Nuisances and for the Preservation of the Public Health.

some trade or calling, or any building, sewer, drain or any substance whatsoever which is or shall become unwholesome and prejudicial to the Public Health, or which shall create a stench and be offensive to the citizens of the said city; and if any such condition shall be found to exist in the limits of the City of Farmington it shall be the duty of the City Police to give notice to such person or persons as shall own or occupy the premises in question to remove and destroy or otherwise dispose of the cause of such nuisance or annoyance and in case such person or persons shall neglect or refuse to remove or destroy or otherwise dispose of such nuisance or annoyance within twenty-four hours after such notice, he, she or they upon conviction thereof shall pay a fine of not less than five dollars and not more than twenty-five dollars, or in default of payment of said fine shall be imprisoned in the county jail not to exceed twenty days.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to throw, place or cause to be placed on the streets, alleys, sidewalks or public grounds of the City of Farmington any dead animal, putrid meat, decayed vegetables, tin cans, rubbish or any other offensive or unwholesome substance or any substance which may become offensive or unwholesome or unhealthy and any person who shall violate the provisions of this section shall upon conviction pay a fine of not less than five dollars and not more than twenty-five dollars and in default of the payment of such fine shall be imprisoned in the county jail not to exceed twenty days.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Police of the City of Farmington to give notice to all persons guilty of the offenses mentioned in the foregoing sections of this ordinance to remove or otherwise destroy the cause of the complaint and upon their failing to remove or abate the nuisance the said police shall cause the same to be done at the expense of the City and the guilty person or persons shall be liable for the cost of such work in addition to the penalties already imposed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance to take effect June 7, 1926.

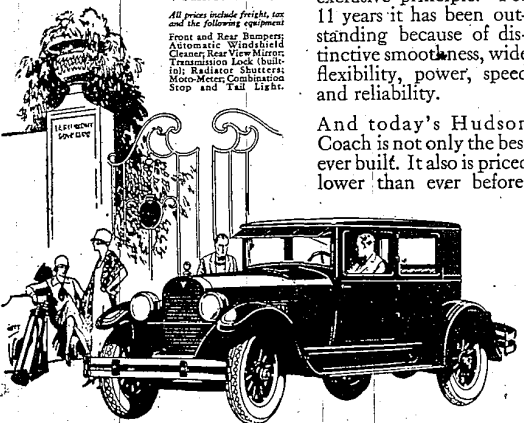
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
