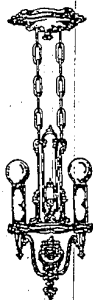

Plea for Protection of Rabbit as "Game"

One eastern state buys over 50,000 rabbits annually, paying 75 to 90 cents apiece for them in Kansas and Missouri, and releases them in its refuges and hunting grounds for the benefit of its sportsmen. Sportsmen's clubs buy many more. In some states rabbits are not even recognized as game, and are given to protection, but the time is near when they will be appreciated everywhere.

The advantage of the rabbit as game is that it can be stocked nearly everywhere; is the most prolific of all game animals; furnishes sport for the masses and a substantial piece of delicious meat in the pot.

It is also important as a buffer to relieve the pressure on partridge, quail, doves, woodcock, snipe and other less abundant species. Game officials can also well afford to encourage the protection of the rabbit as a means of giving the country boy and the ordinary hunter something to shoot near home.—New York Herald Tribune.

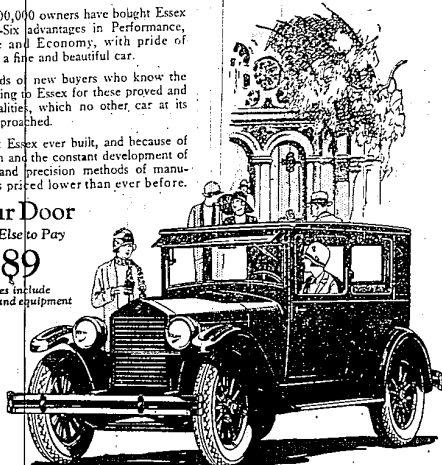

Commissioner Johnson recommended that a grade be established on Rogers street from Division street to Warner street and the center of said street be cut down and filled with good road gravel. Carried.

The plat of the Villa Vista Garden was presented. Motion made by Johnson, supported by Gilmeister, that the plat be approved when sufficient bond to cover cost of improvements is furnished the Commission. Carried all yeas.

The Commissioners were addressed by Mr. Straight of the County Drain office in regard to the Laing drain, the cost of the same to the city and the plan to be adopted in assessing said cost. Moved by Hogle, seconded by Russell, that the recommendation of the Mayor be adopted which is as follows: That we employ legal counsel to advise in regard to this matter. Carried all yeas.

Committee to secure legal advice Butterfield, Hogle and Russell.

A resolution was adopted governing the amount of money that can be borrowed of each bank to defray current expenses during the fiscal year. It must not exceed \$10,000.00 at either the Farmington State Savings Bank or the Peoples State Bank. Recessed subject to call.

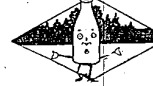

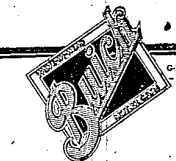
