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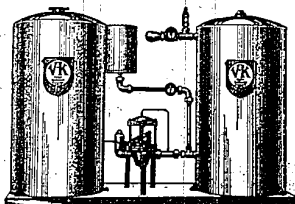

FARM BOYS CAMP

The idea of a special camp for farm boys has become a permanent institution.

Inaugurated as an experiment in 1920 by the County Y. M. C. A. and co-operated with by the Farm Bureau and Agricultural College each year since, the camp for farm boys is just as essential as for any other boy.

The camp this year will be jointly conducted by the town and county "Y" of Oakland and Genesee counties on Lake Copemac in the extreme northwest corner of Oakland county.

A beautiful site even in this region of wonderful lakes is made available through the generosity of C. S. Mott of the General Motors Corporation.

Camp will open on the morning of August 10 and close after breakfast August 18. The entire expense to the camper will be only \$5.00 for the period. Tents, bunks and dishes are all furnished by the camp and each camper providing his own blankets, toilet articles, athletic and musical equipment, etc.

Sheldon Latourette, former club leader in this county and now secretary for Genesee county "Y" will be camp director and tent leaders will be selected from among the club leaders of both counties.

Application for camp can be made to any club leader or direct to Y. M. C. A. or Farm Bureau headquarters at Pontiac.

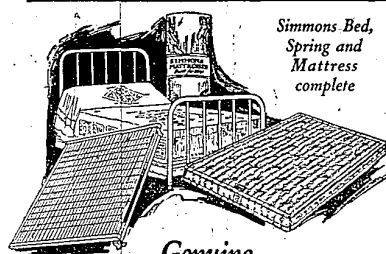
Notice of Review of Special Assessment for the improvement of Assessment District Road No. 467, under Act 39, Public Acts of 1915, as amended.

Whereas, I, as State Highway Commissioner of Michigan, have heretofore determined that the highway commencing at the south section corner common to sections 33 and 34, town 1 north, range 9 east, Farmington Township, Oakland County; thence east on the section line between sections 34, 35 and 36, said Farmington Township, and fractional sections 3, 2 and 1, town 1 south, range 9 east, Livonia Township, Wayne County, to its intersection with State Trunk Line Road No. 16 shall be improved in accordance with the specifications now on file; and

Whereas, I, as such commissioner, did heretofore determine the boundaries of the special assessment district No. 467 for said highway known as Assessment District Road No. 467 to be as follows: Said district includes all lands within the following boundaries in the townships of Farmington, in Oakland County, Livonia, in Wayne County, to-wit:

Commencing at the east ¼ post on the south side of section 36, town 1 north, range 9 east, Farmington Township, Oakland County; thence north ½ mile on the east north-and-south ¼ line of said section 36, to its intersection with the east and west ¼ line of said section 36; thence west 2¼ miles on the east and west ¼ line of sections 36, 35 and 34 to the ¼ post on the west side of said section 34; thence south ½ mile on the west side of said section 34 to the south section corner common to sections 33 and 34; thence east on the south side of said section 33 to the north section corner common to fractional sections 3 and 4, town 1 south, range 9 east,
