Beware of him as you would the sting of a scorpion, for his very presence means financial ruin and dependence. Have but one financial code, and stick to it: Consult your banker first.

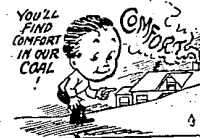

Great Russian Writer

Victim of Delusions

Dostoevsky, the great Russian novelist, is pictured as a man constantly driven by a mad fear that there would be no money for the family's daily necessities, in the recently published diaries by his wife. He must keep to his desk, even on the day following an epileptic seizure. "Occasionally it happened that the first three chapters of a novel were already in print, the fourth set up, the fifth in the mail, the sixth in the writing, the rest a blank." Characteristically enough, Dostoevsky did his writing at night. About eleven o'clock, when the house had quieted down and the noise in the streets was stilled, he sat down to work and spent five or six hours at his desk. He had such intense power of concentration that if his wife came into the room while he was busy with his thoughts he did not see her, and afterward would deny that she had been there at all. There was a peculiar expression on his face at those moments of profound self-communion, which she described as his "inward look." Before dawn Dostoevsky would go to bed and sleep until eleven in the morning. But his wife was careful to leave him alone until he had drunk his coffee and freed himself from the effect of the nightmares and dreams whose vague shapes clouded his first waking hour.—Atlanta Constitution.

Improved Hospital Service

The United States has been establishing new hospitals at the rate of 100 a year since 1920, the American Medical association finds. In a series of tables of hospitals and clinical statistics for 1925 compiled by that organization it is estimated that 60 per cent of all physicians in the United States have immediate hospital connection. Even in the rural districts the sick are being better cared for, for 341 counties have been supplied with hospital service which were without it in 1920.
