PROCEEDINGS
Meeting of the Commissioners of the City of Farmington, held Sept. 8, 1926.

Called to order by Mayor Butterfield.

Commissioners present, Hutton, Hogle, Russell, Johnson, Cook and Gildemeister.

Minutes of the meeting held August 30 read and adopted.

Commissioner Hutton read the report of the committee on the re-arrangement of the interior of the fire hall and heating system.

Motion made by Hogle, seconded by Johnson that Commissioner Russell be empowered to have Detroit Edison lights installed wherever the old D. U. R. lights are defective. Carried all yeas.

Motion made by Russell, seconded by Gildemeister that the Supt. of Public Works be instructed to change the interior of the water tank. Carried.

Motion made by Butterfield, seconded by Hogle that Commissioner Gildemeister be instructed to have the water tank painted.

Two plats or real estate within the city were presented to the Commissioners for their acceptance. After protracted discussion they were held over for future consideration.
