ONTARIO GOES WET

An overwhelming vote of the people of the province decided Wednesday against continuance of the Ontario temperance act, the law they enacted 10 years ago, and which has been enforced as well as could be ever since. Five other provinces previously had tested the dry law and reached the decision later that it was unworkable.

As the result of today's vote the sale of liquor in Canada will be permitted from coast to coast, except only in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. This does not mean saloons will be opened, or that thirsty Americans will be able necessarily to cross the international boundary to obtain the drinks they cannot buy at home.

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
