Egyptians Had Fine Lamps of Alabaster

The Egyptians of 3275 years ago made even finer alabaster lamps than are produced today, says Howard Carter, co-discoverer of Tut-Ankh-Amen's tomb, in the Detroit News. Mr. Carter made known in finding many of these lamps in the tomb the secret of how the Egyptians illuminated their homes.

The lamps were executed in beautiful designs in translucent alabaster, and one of them stood about three feet in height, with a large central cup. There was no decoration on the exterior or the interior, but immediately a light was placed in the vessel there could be seen a picture of the young king and queen in colors.

This effect was produced by another vessel, having the decoration on its exterior, being fitted inside the lamp so cleverly that the joints between the two vessels could not be seen.

"Tagged" Fish a Puzzle

A rubber band mystery that for about twenty years has kept Boston fishermen and merchants guessing as to "how" and "why" of rubber bands found on mackerel from time to time through the years, took a new turn recently. The fishing schooner Aeolus arrived at the fish pier with a swordfish that had a rubber band around its sword, close up to the head. This is the first time that any but mackerel have been so tagged.

Aerial Maps Coming

Twenty years hence a fisherman will not have to run all over the country to find a good fishing spot. He will, instead, consult his mosaic map and the information given on the aerial mosaic will enable him to tell at once where the good spots lie. Incidentally, ideal farm and country home locations will be chosen in a similar manner—from the aerial mosaic map or photograph.

Powerful X-Rays

The newly discovered Milliken light ray has the most powerful penetrating force of all rays ever brought to human notice. It will penetrate a layer of lead six feet thick, whereas the X-ray can be stopped with a thin sheet of the same metal. The new rays are 2,000 times shorter in wave length than the average X-ray.

Aerial Police Patrol

Paul Whittier, an aerial officer appointed by Beverly Hills, Cal., to make a daily patrol of a nearby forest for fires, forced a plane piloted by Jack Fry, commercial aviator, to land, and handed the flyer a traffic tag to appear in court charged with flying at a height of only 600 feet above the city. A city ordinance sets 1,000 feet as the minimum flying altitude.

Gas and Electricity

New York state produces one-sixth of the electricity and one-fourth of the manufactured gas of the United States. The totals, both records among the states, are for electricity more than 10,000,000, 000 kilowatt hours, and for manufacturing gas more than 10,000,000, 000 cubic feet.
